SCOT EVANS

October was the driest month in NYC since record-keeping began more than 100 years ago and South Salem was nearly as dry. Our lake received only a third of an inch of rain in October, which experienced 29 dry days. And the first 10 days of November have been dry.

The silver lining is that the dry weather will help our lake's winter '24 - '25 Drawdown to reach target depth sooner, so gravity silt compaction can occur before sub freezing temperatures harden the exposed lakebed to kill the weed tubers.

Also, riparian (waterfront) owners are asked to please rake & clean your exposed lakebed of vegetation, which should be composted into your gardens, and dispose of any trash and sharp objects encountered. Members have found tires, beer bottles and cans, car batteries, rusted steel drums, chairs, bricks, rib cages of dead deer, discarded fishing tackle, knives, tools and toys.

PLEASE CONSERVE OUR WATER

TLPOA members may not use our community's well water to water lawns. It is healthier for the grass to allow it to go dormant during a drought as the roots grow deeper. Don't worry, the grass will survive! You may of course water your lawn IF you're using lake water or your own PRIVATE well.

Using our community's well water to water your lawn is prohibited. Lawn irrigation systems that draw water from our community well are already prohibited.

WATER CORP UPDATE

LUCILLE MUNZ

Lead Pipe Testing

Per the EPA deadline the Truesdale Lake Water Corp submitted the lead pipe testing results to the New York State Dept of Health. Of the 147 customers, 42 did not respond to our numerous requests for lead testing. I am pleased to report that those who responded, none were lead pipes, with the majority copper lines.

If you are reading this article and have not tested your water line coming into your house, please contact us and test your pipe and/or we can assist you.

We are not sure what the outcome of the non-compliance testing will be. We have been told by the Westchester County Health Department that there will be fines for not having 100% compliance. If this, in fact the case, we will pass those fines onto the individuals who have not tested their lines

Water Quality and Testing
Our drinking water continues to
meet and/or exceeds the current
EPA and Westchester County and
NY State Health Department
requirements.

However, we are aware that the EPA is projecting to reduce

allowable PFOS and PFOA (forever chemicals) in Water, Air, Soil, Waste, Food, and Commerce.

Under EPAs new federal standards, public water systems must comply with new federal max contaminant levels (MCLs) of 4 ppt (part per trillion) for PFOA and 4 ppt (parts per trillion) for PFOS by 2029. EPA has also set MCLs for four additional PFAS not currently regulated in NYS. Until 2029, public water systems must still meet NYS maximum contaminant levels of 10 ppt for PFOA and PFOS. which we currently meet.

We will most likely, like other water suppliers will need to study, access and figure out potential next steps for 2029 compliance changes.

Drinking Water Sub-Committee
In speaking with the TLPOA Board, I recommended that we establish a Drinking Water Sub-Committee, to help evaluate the existing water lines, (age & condition) and everchanging rules and regulations, to figure out a game plan for future improvements and how that can be achieved

DAM & LAKE UPDATE

LAKE DRAW DOWN

You may have noticed we are in the process of lowering the water level in the lake. Last year's attempt was stopped when a series of heavy rainstorms destroyed the siphon setup. It has been rebuilt with steel reinforcement and supports.

The target is to drop the water between 3' and 4'. This will expose the lakebed allowing for the soil to compact and hopefully freeze. The freeze has proven to greatly reduce the plant growth decreasing the need for chemical treatments during the swimming season. This also is a great time to rake and cleanup the exposed lakebed and make any repairs to your docks or walls.

We did successfully treat the Phragmites, but it will take several seasons to eliminate this invasive plant. If you have them on your shoreline, take this opportunity to cut down and remove them. Same goes for the Lily Pads. They may be pretty, but they are quick spreading invasives that will damage our lakes ecosystem.







OUR DAM NEEDS YOU

Our dam is in good shape for its age, but as the study showed, there are structural issues that need to be addressed in order to maintain its structural integrity.

We need to assemble a Dam Team in order to formulate plan for improvements. The two prioritized phases of the necessary work on the dam are:

- 1. Resolve the current gate valve aka sluice gate, which is positioned on the wrong side of the dam, and inoperable. An operable gate would allow us to lower the lake level ahead of a storm, relieving pressure on the dam's walls.
- 2. Widen the spillway to mitigate the flooding by reduce the water volume and therefore structural stress on the 100 year old dam walls.

KEEP YOUR LEAVES Start a Compost Pile

i. Find a dry shady spot away from your house but close enough for a garden hose if it gets too dry. You can use a bin or tumbler, but mine is working great right on the ground.

- Start with a pile of leaves from this fall or already degrading mulch from your woods. The earth worms will come.
- Add layers of brown (carbon) and green (nitrogen) a ratio of 4:1 browns to greens.

Browns: dry leaves, torn up cardboard (we all have it!), small wood chips, torn newspaper and shopping circulars

Greens: grass clippings, garden waste, spent coffee grounds, food scraps (not meat or grease) eggshells, fruit and veggie trimmings. Cover food scraps with Browns

- 4. Mix and Turn your pile use a shovel or pitchfork, this is great exercise!
- 5. Cover or enclose with access so you can throw things in, but animals can't drag things out. We have a small 2.5" chicken are fence around ours because the acons and opossums love it.

you only start with a pile of leaves this winter, you will still be well on your way to composting come spring.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE

We maintain Truesdale Lake common areas year-round.

El Niño gave us a wet winter and by March we were already cleaning up the fallen trees at the basketball court, chipping the remains and clearing the brush.

Again, TLPOA sponsored the neighborhood Twig and Branch Pickup and cleared the sides of the streets for the May flowers. By June the stubborn weeds by the dam and near the lake needed whacking. The well on Howe Street got a nice grooming too.

Throughout the year we cut the brush back at the Gilbert and Lakeshore boat launch along with weeding and the addition of some new mulch.

By August we were whacking down record breaking weed growth everywhere around the lake, the boat areas, TLPOA beach parking area, and along the Lakeshore and Gilbert corner.

And now it's Fall and as much as we love them, the fallen leaves are crispy and ready to go. We remind all residents and friends who help us maintain our community, kindly dispose of clean-up debris in your trash on your property. The Town will not pick-up leaves left alongside of the road.

PLEASE DO NOT PUT LEAVES IN OUR LAKE or on community property

ATTENTION PET OWNERS!

Beware of ticks in the fallen leaves. Leaves provide ticks with a desirable habitat via higher humidity a lower temperatures within the leaf litter, as well as protection from exposure over winter.

AROUND THE LAKE-Sewer Initiative Update

Q & A TOWN MEETING OCT 8 Sue Enos

On Tuesday, October 8th, 90 Lewisboro residents attended a well-received presentation of the proposed sewer project and Sewer Taxing District which would include approximately 300 properties around Truesdale and the Three Lakes (Waccabuc, Oscaleta and Rippowam).

New York State Representative Chris Burdick, Town Supervisor Tony Gonçalves, and Woodard and Curran engineer, Ken Kohlbrenner explained the scope of the sewer project, details of the proposed Sewer Tax District and answered these questions:

WHY A SEWER?

Q. Our lakes and wells are polluted by many things, runoff, fertilizer, goose poop. Why are we working on a sewer?

A. Yes, many pollutants can impact lakes and drinking water. Studies have shown that septic systems in these areas are older, often in poor soils, and contribute a substantial amount of pollution to both groundwater aquifers and lakes. This will worsen as increasing precipitation events occur. We should continue to focus on reducing other sources of pollution in addition to the sewer.

SEWER PLANT

Q. Will the sewer treatment plant be noisy, will it smell, will it be lit up 24 hours a day?

A. Treatment will be inside a building, which will be designed to contain odors and noise. The Oakridge and Wild Oaks plants are run by the town and have all the operations inside the building. There are also private plants on Michelle Estates or the small plant at the former Lewisboro Elementary School. Lighting would be minimized but allow safe nightlime access. The backup generator would be outside and would cause some noise when running or exercising.

Q. What if there's a big storm, could chemicals or materials in the plant run down to Truesdale Lake?

A. The plant would be designed with containment systems. All chemicals and processing would take place under cover inside a plant building.

Q. Where will the plant effluent go?

A. The effluent would be discharged to the tributary to the Waccabuc River below the Truesdale Lake outfall.

MONEY

Q. What if the Town doesn't get grants? Will they have to borrow money and then what is the cost of the loan?

A. The project will not go forward unless the capital costs are covered by grants. A loan is not under consideration at this time.

Q. Is \$1450 the average cost per home? Will a house that is worth more pay more?

A. The details will be available when the Map, Plan, and Report is released. Some sewer districts charge partially based on water volume or a proxy for water use such as bedroom count. (Creation of the Map, Plan and Report is the first step in the process

COMMUNITY IMPACT

Q. Will a sewer system enable unconstrained building and change the character of the community?

A. Normal zoning and building codes apply. The DEP limits building to 80% of the capacity of the sewer plant. The formation of the district includes a sewer law that will apply just to the district, which could, if the community wanted, impose additional restrictions. This will be known before the vote. Note that today houses can be limited by the number of bedrooms but still be quite large.

Q. This will benefit everyone around the lakes, and everyone who drinks the water. Can they share the costs?

A. The laws on district formation do not allow this. The sewer users must pay for the operations and maintenance.

Q. If we use state and county money for the sewer capital costs, do we have to open our lakes to the public?

A. No.

ELECTRICAL OUTAGES

Q. What if the power goes out?

A. The system will be designed with extra capacity to deal with power outages. The plant will have a backup generator and individual pumps will have a generator connection point. For homes without a backup generator, systems operators would use portable generators to power the grinder pumps and street pumps in the event of a lengthy outage. We don't know of battery backup systems for grinder pumps at this time, which will require further study.


At the November 12 th Lewisboro Town Board meeting, the Town Board approved the acceptance of the NYEFC WIIA (New York Environmental Facilities Corporation Water Infrastructure Improvement Act) grant of \$6.875M towards the Clean WOTR Project. Clean WOTR is the project name for the proposed sewer initiative and Sewer District which would include approximately 300 properties around Lakes Waccabuc, Oscaleta, Truesdale, and Rippowam.



Tony Gonçalves also provided an overview of the projected cost of the project and the grant money received to date.

The Capital costs of building the wastewater treatment plant and main sewer lines will be paid for with the grant money awarded for that purpose. A date for the vote on a Sewer Tax District has not yet been set.



The next step in the sewer initiative will be the preparation of the actual "Map, Plan and Report" by an engineering firm. This will specify the following; exactly which properties will be included in the Sewer Tax District, the engineering details and associated costs, as well as time lines for the project.

Before the project can begin, the property owners identified on the sewer "Map" will vote on whether or not to form a Tax District to pay the ongoing maintenance of the wastewater treatment system after it is installed.

SOPHIE AND THE SWANS



Holly Peppe. Truesdale Lake resident is an award winning author, poet, and a teacher of music and literature. Shares her new book about friendship overcoming bullying.

Sophie and the Swans is the story of a little girl who makes friends with a pair of swans who visit her every day. One day, when a bully starts to torment the swans. Sophie rushes to defend them, not by attacking the bully, but by showing him kindness when he gets into trouble on the lake.

I spoke with the author Holly Peppe, who lives with her husband on Truesdale Lake, about her inspiration for the book.

"Some of this story is based on fact-my imagination wrote the rest! It is set on our beautiful lake and Sophie's cabin is modeled after my writing cabin below our house. I've spent many happy hours there writing and admiring the swans, as Sophie does in the story.

A few years ago. I made friends with a pair of swans I named Romeo and Juliet who visited the shoreline below my cabin every day. I was fascinated by their beauty and strength and happy to learn that swan couples stay together for life. I was struck by their loyalty to one another and hoped they never suffered from the often-thoughtless actions of human beings.

I started writing a factual book about swans for children but decided it would be more useful to write a book that gently taught a lesson. Sophie's story carries an anti-bullying message because unfortunately, bullying among students is an issue in both elementary and high schools. The book illuminates the problem and shows how the power of kindness can sometimes discourage that behavior.

I believe all children are inherently good but sometimes follow the bad example of others or lash out because they themselves have been bullied. They are also easily influenced, so I felt that giving them a strong role model like Sophie might help them deal with unkindness or bullving in their own lives

Sophie sums up the theme of the book when she explains why she wants to help her neighbor, even though he had acted like a bully toward her and the swans: My mother says we should always treat others with kindness, even if they aren't kind to you.

Sophie and the Swans has received accolades including a Family Choice Award, a Purple Dragonfly Book Award, and glowing reviews from several sources including The Children's Book Review.

100% of the author's proceeds from the book will be donated to three nonprofit organizations that prevent bullying among children and cruelty to animals: The National Bullying Prevention Center, We the Best, and Animal Nation, located here in South Salem.



Lewisboro Library hosted an event for kids and parents on Nov 16th to meet Holly in person for a story time and craft to celebrate the release of her book. It was a beautiful event.
